Assessment of community capacity	BADC and DPI continue to pursue the IRB approval process to obtain data for the college population. The staff has obtained the necessary Collaborative Institute Training Initiative Program in multiple areas as part of the submission process. PFS staff has submitted informed consent certification to Georgia Southern. The subrecipient college community has other priorities, and DPI is struggling with obtaining baseline data at this location. The two BADC colleges are providing archival data.	9/30/2021
	Each community has baseline data for 14-18-year-olds (2020). Additional data collected during the pandemic is sparse. Bulloch County schools chose not to participate in the GA DOE Wellness Survey. The Georgia Student Health Survey has been mandatory for all schools, and the staff anticipates that this will resume this year. Decatur did participate in the Wellness Survey. However, GA DOE eliminated many questions. The survey sample was small, and this data will not be used for comparison data. DPI also collected data from community members to help identify root causes, local conditions, and community norms. Partners conducted a listening for young people to determine the most effective ways to inform youth about marijuana. Feedback is gathered at each coalition meeting to help drive strategies and assess training needs. Each community is routinely considering membership and determining gaps in participation and training needs.

Identification of community gaps in services	After a review of the current needs assessment, both communities have identified the following gaps: Need for prevention services in local high schools in both communities. The schools are in active discussion with the PFS staff to offer EBP as schools open up. Seeking additional clarification of prevention and early intervention services provided at colleges in both communities. There is no identified centralized access point or network to reach young adults ages 18-24, particularly those not enrolled in college. DPI is seeking alternative access to youth through local agencies (Decatur Housing Authority and YMCA). Both communities utilize media campaigns to build awareness and readiness. The gap between interagency communication and collaboration is still being experienced in subrecipient communities regarding college. Difficulty sampling target populations	GA DOE did not offer the GA Student Health Survey in 2020 due to the pandemic. Bulloch County schools chose not to administer the alternative Wellness survey, and the City Schools of Decatur administered the alternative survey with approximately 20% of their regular participation. This data is not comparable to last year's data and is only being assessed as stand-alone data (not for trend data). Both college communities were prepared to move forward Fall Semester; however, the BADC colleges wellness director and staff were forced to focus all resources on COVID-19. Decatur college is not actively engaging with DPI, despite many attempts and avenues considered. The staff did not administer the surveys as planned. Staff is seeking IRB approval. The university contact did not inform project staff of the need for additional certification to submit an IRB request. The team obtained the necessary CITI certification.	No		BADC has formed a steering committee that is meeting regularly. The participants are very positive, expressing interest and need for this project. 	GA Southern University students did not return to campus until Fall Semester 2020. Bulloch County public schools re-opened with a hybrid model in mid-August 2020. Bulloch schools are the proposed site for the implementation of the new individual-level strategy. The city of Decatur schools re- opened in mid-August virtually only and did not open in a hybrid model until late spring. Agnes Scott College re- opened completely virtual as well and returned in the Winter of 2021. Staff could not administer the surveys for 18-25-year-olds because the lead point persons on the college/university project were redirected to focus on COVID-19 issues exclusively. Greek Life on GA Southern campus had recently conducted a student survey. However, the results are being delayed due to COVID. This survey would have provided BADC with secondary data.	COVID. Project staff identified an alternate individual- level strategy, but schools were unwilling to allow additional programming during the pandemic. The reason given by the school administration was that most students are struggling with academics now, and teachers should add no new activities at this time. Schools in both communities are open to programming in 2021-2022, and screening has occurred in one community. Actual program delivery will begin in that community in late October. Both communities have relied heavily on digital campaigns to increase awareness. Based on the community readiness score, this is an appropriate strategy.

Access to Prevention Efforts

In the subrecipient community, DPI has worked diligently with the local school system to expand services for high school youth. In July, DPI received permission to offer an evidence-based program to all ninth-grade students (an estimated 350+) during the school day. During this program, DPI has obtained permission to screen youth at high risk for substance abuse and mental health issues. This screening is a part of the EBP chosen by both communities. As schools are only beginning to be open to outside entities coming into the classroom, the screening took place in mid-October of 2021. The PreVenture workshops will start on October 26. Eighty-six youth were identified as high risk. Training for group Facilitators occurred this summer, and two facilitators will being groups, with priority being given to those in highest need. Many of those youth will fall into our health disparity categories.

School personnel will provide data to assess some of the more sensitive data, such as financial needs.

Summarize how the collection and reporting of community-level PFS Required Outcome Measure was written in your approved PFS Strategic Plan: In the data collection section of our strategic plan, BADC and DPI described how BADC and DPI were going to use the colleges and universities in the target communities (in Bulloch County and Decatur) to reach populations between 18-25.

Furthermore, BADC and DPI described how BADC and DPI are going to target specific segments of the college campuses such as students attending athletic events and schools (such as the School of Public Health) within the universities that have a vested interested in substance abuse. BADC and DPI acknowledged that there is a significant number of the 18-25-year-old population not enrolled in a college or university. To reach those members of the population, BADC and DPI plan to collect data at locations in the community, which is frequented by members of the population in this age range, such as social clubs, festivals, and adult athletic leagues. Moreover, to be more thorough in our data collection, BADC and DPI described how the organizations would use social media to reach the population with automated survey collection. The data collected will be reported throughout the year quarterly (process data), semi-annually (community progress), and annually (achievement/barriers/lessons learned).

Does the requested substitution differ from what was written in your approved PFS Strategic Plan? **Yes - This survey will be** tailored to meet the specific needs of the two PFS communities. The assessment tool written in the proposal was unable to be adapted.

Reason for the substitution request: **BADC** and **DPI** are substituting to use the Indiana University Prevention Insight College Survey to achieve the best possible survey response from the target population. The results will more accurately provide outcomes necessary to make the most significant impact on the target populations. The opportunity to modify the questions to improve the specificity of the results and expected outcomes is plus, in addition to the opportunity to receive data reports and a narrative from the survey developer. BADC and DPI will be able to disseminate an electronic version of the survey in addition to the paper and pencil surveys. The developer has results to show the survey will be successful if implemented with the target population identified if used correctly. Overall, the results of this data collection tool will allow for valid and reliable data that will for modifying strategies if necessary, and improve the implementation strategy once the phase begins.
